**The London Underground**  
 Also known as the "Tube", this is the fastest way to travel around London, especially over long distances. The Underground Map is designed to indicate clearly which stations allow you to transfer from one line to another. The Underground system is divided into six fare zones, with the city centre being in Zone 1. The price of a ticket depends on how many zones you travel through.

#### TRAVEL INFORMATION

**London Transport Information Centres:**

**London Buses**  
 Most are red double-deckers. There are two types of stop: *compulsory* (sign with white background) where all buses indicated will stop without being hailed, unless they are full; *request* (sign with red background) where buses stop only when you raise your hand allowing the driver to see you well in advance. Fares are according to the distance, which and how many of the fare zones you travel through.

#### BUS TOURS

Bus tours run daily at frequent intervals and include live commentary by professional guides or recorded commentary available in several languages. Tickets are valid for 24 hours and allow you to get on and off as often as you like at many different places around central London. You may purchase your ticket on boarding the bus.

The most popular **departure points** are: Baker Street Station (C3); Trocadero (F5); Speakers' Corner, Marble Arch (C5); Grosvenor Gardens, Victoria (E8).

#### RIVER TRIPS

There are riverboat services operating frequent tourist trips from:

**Westminster Pier (G7):** *Downstream services to the Tower of London, Greenwich and the Thames Flood Barrier (Mar-Nov); Upstream services to Kew Gardens, Richmond and Hampton Court Palace (Apr-Sep);* There are also evening cruises at weekends in summer.

**Embankment Pier (GH6):** *Downstream services to the Tower of London, Greenwich and the Thames Barrier.*

**Tower Pier (M6):** *Downstream services to Greenwich; Upstream services to Embankment Pier and Westminster Pier.*

### Navy - Marine Corps Team To Assist In Venezuela

Norfolk, Va. — Two Norfolk-based ships will depart this week to provide humanitarian assistance in the flood-ravaged country of Venezuela.

*USS Nashville* (LPD 13) and *USS Tortuga* (LSD 46) will provide a maritime platform for Navy Construction Battalion and Marine Corps engineering personnel who will help the Venezuelans clear roads along the Venezuelan coastline. The roads must be cleared to allow emergency relief efforts access to coastal cities.

The ships will make brief stops in North Carolina and Puerto Rico to pick up personnel and equipment before proceeding to Venezuela. *Tortuga* is scheduled to depart Tuesday and *Nashville* is expected to get underway later this week. It is anticipated that *Nashville* will remain off the Venezuelan coastline to support sea-based engineer operations for approximately two months. *Tortuga* will return to Norfolk after the equipment and personnel have been off loaded in Venezuela.

*Nashville* and *Tortuga* are both amphibious landing platforms and will be loaded with bulldozers, tractors, helicopters, engineering equipment and landing craft. Both ships will be accompanied by Navy Beachmaster Units homeported in Norfolk to assist in off-loading personnel and equipment ashore in Venezuela.

The ships will on-load a Marine Corps Engineer Task Force in Morehead City, N.C., and a Navy Engineer Detachment stationed at Naval Station Roosevelt Roads, P.R.


